

Gahcho Kué Mine Early Learning and Child Care Bursaries (12)

De Beers Gahcho Kué Mine supports up to 12 distance Early Learning and Child Care graduates annually from 2022 through 2030 with \$2,000 scholarships. Up to \$216,000 will be awarded over the life of the program. These awards support part-time, online, certificate and diploma graduates who live in the NWT.

De Beers Group Practicum Bursaries for School of Health and Human Services

De Beers Group has committed up to \$45,000 per year for 2024-2026 to support practicum experiences for students in the School of Health and Human Services in NWT communities outside of Yellowknife. The bursaries allow students to gain skills and knowledge working in smaller, more rural health care settings, and may help alleviate staffing shortages in small centres by encouraging graduates to consider working outside of Yellowknife.
